


## RECEPTION

We have kick started this terms topic of 'Arctic Africa' with some great geography work. The children were really keen to share their knowledge of what a globe is and to learn all about the seven continents of the world. They have enjoyed exploring the new activities in the classroom and made great Arctic explorers. In English we have been using the story 'Handa's Surprise'. The children were great at role playing the story and using adjectives to describe the fruit that the animals stole from the basket. A great first week back and we are looking forward to all the exciting things that we will be doing this term.







# YEAR 2



Year 2 have had a very busy week! They have started their new text, 'If all the World Were...' by Joseph Coelho and have been busy weighing in both grams and kilograms in maths. We have begun learning about the Great Fire of London and considering primary evidence such as Pepys's diary and paintings from the time. In science we have started our new topic of 'Growing Plants' by looking at a variety of seeds, examining them closely with a hand lens and drawing them.



# YEAR 3



What a great start to the second part of the Spring term from all the children! Year 3 have started working on their new topic: "Rainforests". In English, the children analysed the features of non-chronological reports and learned about the use of possessive apostrophes. Fractions were the focus of Year 3 Maths lessons this week. The children particularly enjoyed doing practical activities while sharing pizzas and garlic bread. In Geography, we have been working with atlases to identify countries of the world with areas of rainforest. A lovely and busy first week back!









## YEAR 4

Year 4 have been learning to find missing lengths, and the perimeter, of rectilinear shapes. We used whiteboard pens on our tables to draw the shapes and show our methods and calculations. Don't worry, the pen wiped away, and our classroom is nice and clean again.







Year 4 loved learning about the Buddhist festival of Wesak. We learnt that Wesak is the most important Buddhist festival and is celebrated during the full moon in May. It is held each year to celebrate the birthday of Buddha, where Buddhists clean and decorate their homes, wash the shoulders of their Buddha statue, and offer gifts to Buddha. We learnt that different countries celebrate in different ways, and today we made bird cages and paper lanterns like Buddhists in Thailand and Indonesia would.



In English, we have started reading How to Train Your Dragon by Cressida Cowell, and we are absolutely loving it! We have discussed who the main characters in the story are so far (Hiccup, Fishlegs, Gobber, Dogsbreath, Snotlout). We talked about our first impressions of these characters and could explain why we felt that way.

Using the illustrations from the front of the book, we put pictures of these characters around the room with large pieces of paper and marker pens for recording. We visited each character to record any information we know about the character, or any first impressions we have made using inference clues from the book. We used our retrieval and inference skills e.g. the other boys don't like Hiccup; I know this because they tease him and call him useless. Fishlegs is allergic to dragons, and we used evidence from the text to justify our answers.





This week, the children have been focussing on equivalent fractions and decimals. We took our learning outdoors this week, where the children were given the task of finding the equivalent forms of fractions and decimals written on the playground. They also had to find missing fractions and decimals on a number line. The children benefited from learning in a visual, hands-on way and this certainly showed with the reasoning understanding back in the classroom.

In English, the children have started their class text: Oh, Maya Gods. We have been delving deeper into the main character, answering some challenging vocabulary

questions, before planning a Maya myth.

The children have really engaged with the class text with some great understanding.

In curriculum, the children have been learning all about the ancient Maya civilisation. With their maths heads on, the children produced an accurate timeline to scale, inputting key facts in chronological order. They were then given the challenge to match descriptions to a range of primary sources of historical evidence, before explaining reasons behind their answers. The class tackled this problem with a great historian head on!



#### YEAR 6

This week, Year 6 have been busy developing their understanding of decimals. They have been identifying the value of each digit, rounding, as well as adding and subtracting. They have been working incredibly hard and have enjoyed cracking all the extra reasoning challenges. Well done, Year 6.

In English, the children have been completing their biographies. They have tried so hard to include the features required in Year 6 writing, and have used complex punctuation, relative clauses, parenthesis, time conjunctions as well as all the key features of a biography! They have really enjoyed sharing their writing with each other and showing the features they have included.

In history, we have been learning about polar exploration and investigating where to place events on a timeline. The children were able to apply their knowledge from our work on Scott and Shackleton to help them decide the correct chronology. Excellent teamwork, Year 6.

In art this week, the children continued to Modroc their penguins and are now one step closer to creating







the class 'waddle'. They also planned their ideas for painting their sculpture and took ideas from different species. They are all looking forward to completing their final designs.
